## ASSAY RESULTS CONFIRM STRIKE POTENTIAL AT COMMODORE - DIAMOND DRILLING TO COMMENCE

- Assays received for BVNC003, located 150m north of discovery hole BVNC002 which intersected 1m @ 5.89% Ni
- BVNC003 intersected a zone of extremely weathered and gossanous ultramafic rock which returned 22m @ 0.27% Ni, 170ppm Cu, 10ppb Pt, 20ppb Pd from 92m
- Very strong geochemical signature indicates likelihood of additional nickel sulphide mineralisation in fresh rock
- Diamond drilling to commence 8 October 2021
- Further downhole electromagnetic (DHEM) surveys to follow

Metal Hawk Limited (ASX: MHK, "Metal Hawk" or "The Company") is pleased to announce assay results returned from BVNC003 at the Commodore nickel prospect, located within the Company's Berehaven Nickel Project, 20 kilometres east of Kalgoorlie. BVNC003 was drilled 150m north of the 5.9% massive nickel sulphide intersected in BVNC002 ([Assay Results Confirm High Grade Nickel Discovery 28/09/2021](#)).


**BVNC003 intersected 22m @ 0.27% Ni, 170ppm Cu, 10ppb Pt, 20ppb Pd from 92m** (See Table 2 for full results). This zone of highly weathered ultramafic rock is similar in grade, but broader in width, than the weathered gossanous material intersected in discovery hole **BVNC002** which returned **9m @ 0.31% Ni, 185ppm Cu, 18ppb Pt and 34ppb Pd** above the transitional massive sulphide zone from 144m to 145m grading **5.89% Ni**

Managing Director Will Belbin commented: *"The geochemistry from the intensely weathered ultramafic zone intersected in BVNC003 indicates that there is a very good chance we will see additional nickel sulphides at depth. The geochemical signature of this zone is similar to the aircore end-of-hole anomaly in BNMA001 which led to the discovery of massive sulphides at Commodore."*



*"These results confirm that the nickel sulphide mineralisation at Commodore is open and untested along strike and at depth. We will be following up these results shortly with deeper drilling and downhole EM as we progress this exciting new discovery."*


Three RC holes were drilled for a total of 485m at the Commodore nickel prospect, located five kilometres north of the Blair Nickel Mine (which produced 1.26Mt @ 2.62% Ni for 32,900 tonnes of contained nickel).

Assay results are pending for BVNC001 and the remainder of BVNC002.



**Figure 1.** BVNC003 samples – geochemical target zone highlighted






**Figure 4.** Aerial view looking south towards the Blair Nickel Mine

## NEXT STEPS

Diamond drilling is due to commence Friday 8<sup>th</sup> October. Deeper drilling will follow up the massive nickel sulphide discovery at Commodore and will also investigate the conductive source detected in downhole and moving loop electromagnetic surveys. Staged RC drilling will also commence shortly and will test the zone of massive sulphides immediately along strike from BVNC002, progressively exploring the target ultramafic stratigraphy at Commodore.
